Health care gets 9.78% boost, cancer treatment costs to drop

Customs duty exemption for lifesaving drugs, more money for Ayushman Bharat

SOHINI DAS Mumbai, 1 Febr

The Centre's health care Budget sew a 978 per cent increase to 789,887 crore for 2025-26, with a 28.8 per cent rise in the allocation for Ayushman Bharat-Fradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (AD-PMJAY), which is now at 89,406 crore. There was also relief for cancer patients with 36 cancer and rare disease druss beine exerented from Basic druss beine exerented from Basic drugs being exempted from Basic Customs Duty (BCD) and support for district hospitals to open cancer

for district hospitals to open cancer care centres.

The Department of Pharmaceuticals (0.09) received a 28.32 per cent boost, with 63,268.72 crore allocated. The promotion of bulk drug parks rose from 01,000 crore to 01,460 crore, while produc-tion-linked incentive schemes (PLI) saw a smaller rise from 02,143 crore 123,244.6 (2019).

Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman announced plans to establish day-care cancer centres in all district hospitals within three years, with 200 centres opening in 2025-26. This initiative aims to sigand the second s annually. Exports have advocated for building capacity through a hub-and-spoke model for cancer care, with an estimated need for 10,000-15,000 more day-care beds and 25,000 surgical beds to serve all reported cancer patients.

Cancer treatment is set to become more affordable, Sitharaman numorated adults as 46 fees from three.

proposed adding 36 lifesaving drugs to the list of those exempted from BCD. Another six lifesaving medicines will now be subject to a 5



per cent concessional Customs duty. These drugs include those for rare genetic disorders like spinal mus-cular atrophy in children and can-cer treatments like Asciminib (leukemia), with some drugs cur-rent benefit in the Parketter. rentlypriced in crores. The Customs duty cuts will bring meaningful relief to patients. Currently, most cancer drugs face a 10 per cent BCD.

Dept of pharmaceuticals* Furthermore, specific medicines supplied under Patient Assistance Programmes (PAPs) by pharmaceu-tical companies, including drugs for breast cancer (Ribociclib by Novartis), severe asthma (AstraZeneca's Benralizumab), and Crohn's disease or ulcerative colitis (Takeda's Vedolizumab), are now fully exempt from BCD. The finance

minister proposed adding 37 more medicines and 13 new PAPs. "By prioritising affordability and access, these initiatives not only provide critical financial relief to patients and their families but also strengthen the rare disease coosys-tem in India," said Ruchi Sogarwal, director of corporate affairs at Takeda Biopharmaceuticals India.

The National Digital Health Mission (ABDM) allocation increased by a substantial 70.06 per increased by a substantial 70.06 per cent to 8240.11 crore. The Pradhan Mantri Swasthya Suralska Vojana (PMSSY), focused on correcting ragional healthcare imbalances, saw a 10.4 per cent rise to 82940 crore, while the central hospital budget grew 4.69 per cent to 14.621 crore. To boost healthcare research, the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) received \$2,12.55 crore, a 14.4 per cent increase from the previous year.

nline platforms such as nline platforms such as Swiggy, Zomato, Ama-zon and Flipkart are likely to see increased interest for delivery-partner and ware-house-worker jobs as the Union nouse-worker/jobs as the Union Budget has proposed formalis-ing the gig economy, industry executives told Mint. Finance minister Nirmala Sitharaman announced in her

budget speech on Saturday that budget speech on Saturday that gig workers would be provided health insurance under the gov-ernment's flagship Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (AB-PMJAY). Currently, the National Health Authority (NHA) implements the world's largest health insur-ance scheme, which provides health cover of 3.5 lakh per famneath cover of G lake per lam-ily per year. Under the terms of AB-PMJAY, there is no waiting period and no restrictions on pre-existing health conditions. Gig workers will also be issued identity cards and be eli-

issued identity cards and be eli-gible to register on the e-Shram portal, the national database of unorganized workers under the labour ministry. Balasubrama-

nian Anantha Narman Anantha Nar-ayanan, senior vice president at Team Lease Services Ltd, said, "Officially

Including gig workers in the organized ecosystem will help them get employment benefits, and encourage more people take advantage of the growing opportunities."

Madhav Krishna, founder and chief executive of Vahan.ai, a blue-collar recruitment platform in Bengaluru. 'Food and grocery delivery platforms, e-commerce companies, and logistics firms will see massive benefits as formalisation kicks in," he added.

More than 85% of India's workforce is informal and a majority of it comprises gig workers, according to Teamlease's Narayanan. Online comerce and logistics platforms are among the biggest employers of gig workers in the form of elivery agents and dark-store delivery agents and dark-store workers.

These workers have become pivotal to the operations of the platforms as speedy and efficient deliveries boost brand loyalty and customer satisfaction.
The number of gig workers in

India is expected to increase to 23.5 million by 2029-30 from 7.7 million last year, Niti Aayog estimates.

estimates.

The growing digital economy has created more employment opportunities, especially for the freelancing workforce. As a result, the gig economy is also set to grow to 235 million workers by FY30, when it will com-

prise 4.1% of the total workforce.
"The digital economy has sig-nificantly broadened job oppor-tunities encompassing roles

tunities encompassing roles from delivery personnel, cab drivers, and beauty profession-als to software engineers and data analysts, "according to the Economic Survey 2024-25. Moreover, hyperlocal service platforms have revolutionized the job landscape in the trans-port, food delivery and home services industries by creating flexible employment options by leveraging technology while leveraging technology while transforming traditional service sectors into digitally driven eco-systems, the survey added.

To be sure, many platforms

have already extended benefits such as health insurance to gig

workers.



Apart from high food prices, rising medical and healthcare costs have also burdened the common people. To protect poor families from catastrophic health expenses, the government launched its flagship health insurance scheme, Ayushman Bharat, in 2018. Last year, it was expanded to cover senior citizens as well. However, the scheme has mostly seen funds being under-utilized. That is set to change in 2024-25, with the final spending set to cross the budget, and with a fresh hike in 2025-26.

100% FDI in insurance: Too little, too late

Well-established insurers don't need the expertise of foreign players, but smaller peers may benefit

GUIARAT

he government in its Union Budget for 2025-26 proposed raising the foreign direct investment (FDI) limit for India's insurance sector to 100% from 74%, meeting a long-awaited industry demand.

So why did the stocks of most Indian insurance companies end the day flat to negative? The simple reason is that wellestablished life insurance companies in India don't need the expertise of foreign players through strategic stake sale any

Also, the interest of foreign companies in Indian insurance has declined over the years. Standard Life (now known as ABRDN Plc.), New York Life Insurance Co., and Old Mutual Ltd after partnering with HDFC Life Insurance Co. Ltd, Max Life and Kotak Life, respectively, have exited India.

There is also a need to distinguish between the government-approved limit and company-specific limit approved by the board of directors of a company. For instance, even with the foreign ownership limit at 74%, HDFC Life had

capped it at 49%. The lack of interest of foreign investors in Indian life insurance companies is evident from the fact that

not only is the existing limit of 49% underutil-

ized, their shareholding has been gradually falling—from 31.4% in December 2023 to 25.3% in December 2024.

The same is true for ICICI Prudential Life Insurance Co. Ltd, which has an approved limit of 74%, but actual utilization stands at just 36.8%. ICICI Lombard General Insurance Co. Ltd also has less than 25% foreign shareholding despite the limit of 74%.

This brings us to the moot question: why would established players like, say, SBI Life Insurance Co. Ltd, be happy to let their shareholding drop below 26%? Effectively, this means that even if 100% FDI is permitted in the insurance sector, if companies don't want to let go of their stake, there is little that foreign investors can do. For small or fringe insurers that are looking to exit completely, the budget proposal presents an opportunity as foreign insurance giants do not have to worry about the nuisance of having to deal with minority shareholders interfering in management holding a 26% stake. A case in point is Kotak Mahindra Gen-

eral Insurance Co. Ltd, which had less

than 1% market share in annual premiu in the general insurance sector and sold 70% of its stake to Zurich Insurance Co. Ltd for ₹5,560 crore in June. It might be well-placed to exit completely if it wants after the latest budget announcement. Before Acko Life Insurance, Credit Ac-

cess Life Insurance and Kshema General Insurance began operations in 2022-23, life and non-life insurers in India were registered in 2011 and 2017, respectively. None of these companies is promoted by foreigners. The promoters of these companies could have anyway raised funds by selling a 74% stake.

Even if foreign companies want to set up shop in India, they would want to have a minority partner as it helps in having a distribution network. So, in any case, it is likely that they would have less than a 100% stake. While it is assumed that the increase in FDI limit will enhance competition, the Indian insurance market already has too many players, with 26 life insurers and 34 general insurers, as per the data on the regulator's website. Also, most of the incremental growth

for life insurance companies is from unitlinked insurance plan (Ulip) sales, indi-cating that insurance has become more of an investment. The govern ambition to ensure 'insurance for all by 2047' could be met through extensive coverage of Ayushman Bharat (its health insurance scheme) and that business is likely to be bagged by public sector general insurers. The most significant change for Indian non-life or general insurance companies could happen if the goods and services tax (GST) is abolished. increasing affordability. But that falls under the domain of the GST Council. When it happens, it should see increased interest in general insurance from for-eigners and domestic players alike.

A new jobs blueprint for India's young

Plan to create opportunities in rural areas so that migration to cities is an option not a necessity

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he government's focus on creating jobs for informal and gig workers comes at a time when the economy has been struggling to create enough formal jobs. So, the government is leaning on agriculture, manu-

feaning on agriculture, manufacturing, micro, small, and medium enterprises (MSMEs) and startups to generate more employment opportunities for the country's burgeoning youth. For instance, under 'Building Rural

For instance, under 'Building Rural Prosperity and Resilience', the government aims to generate new businesses and employment for young farmers, marginal and small farmers, landless families and rural women. 'The goal is to generate ample opportunities in rural areas so that migration is an option, but not a necessity,' said finance minister Nirmals Sitharaman in her eighth straight budget speech on Saturday.

In fact, migration to the urban regions can be detrimental for many because skill gaps ked to fewer employment opportunities for those who moved to bigger cities. "There needs to be more clarity on rural job creation. About 60% of our workforce is linked to rural employment and more details are needed on how to create jobs at such a large scale," said Grurprasad Srinivasan, group chief executive officer (CEO) of stafling firm QuessCorp.

Friday's Economic Survey for FY25 said that India needs to create an average of 7.85 million non-farm jobs annually until 2030 to effectively engage its growing working population. Therefore, the pressure to generate more jobs indiverse industries becomes crucial.

Hence, the government will attempt to create employment in labour-intensive sectors. The Focus Product Scheme for footwear and leather sectors is expected to create 2.2 million jobs. The scheme will support design capacity, component manufacturing, and machinery required for production of non-leather quality footwear, besides the support for leather footwear and products. A National Action Plan for Toys, with the aim to make India aglobal hub for toys is expected to bring in development of clusters, skills, and a manufacturing ecosystem.

There are 10 million registered MSMEs, employing 75 million. To help them achieve higher efficiencies of scale, technological upgrade and better access to capital, budget raised the investment and turnover limits for classification of all MSMEs by 2.5 and 2 times respectively. "This will give them the confidence to grow and generate employment for our youth," Sitharaman said.

These efforts to boost employment

The Economic Survey reveals a troubling decline in earnings across self-employed and salaried workers over the past seven years. On the startup front, in what would lead to enhancement of credit availability, the government said it would increase credit availability from 10 crore to 120 crore, with the guarantee fee being moderated to 1% for loans in 27 focus sectors important for Atmanirbhar Bharat.

he Union budget pre-sented on Saturday saw a 9.8% increase in the allo-cation for the healthcare sector to 399,858.56 crore from 390,958.68 crore in the previous financial year but overall health allocation remained below 2% of the budget.

The budget extended the Ayushman Bharat health insur-ance scheme to gig workers, increased the number of seats in medical education, lent support to medical tourism, announced the establishment of 200 cancer daycare centres and exempted duties on 36 essential medicines

for cancer and rare diseases. Sitharaman said another six life-saving medicines are to be added to the list of drugs that attract a customs duty of 5% if these drugs are provided free of charge to eligible beneficiaries.

Around one in nine people in India are expected to face a can-cer diagnosis during their life-time. Around 70 million Indians are estimated to suffer from rare diseases as per the Indian Coun-cil of Medical Research. Official data says

3,125 crore the projected cancer burden in Indiais expected to rise from 26.7 allocated to Indian Council of Medical million DALYs workon (disability-ad-justed life years) in 2021 to 29.8 mil-lion in 2025, with the pressing health challenges highest burden in the

north and northeast.

The proposals were part of a health budget that made up a paltry 1.97% of total allocations, slightly up from 1.90% in the previous budget. Nikkhil K Masurkar, CEO,

Nikkhil K Masurkar, CEO, Entod Pharmaceuticals said the move will boost exports of key drugs. "The removal of basic customs duty on 36 life-saving drugs, along with reductions on bulk drugs, is a commendable move that will make essential medicines more affordable for patients," he said.

Daara Patel, secretary general at the Indian Drugs Manufac-tures Association added, "This will help us serve millions of lives and support our initiatives of being patient-centric." Additionally, the finance minister said she proposed to

set up 200 daycare cancer cen-tres—one in every district hos-pital—over the next three years, another step welcomed by

"Setting of daycare cancer centres at district level is a wel-come step. These centres will provide facilities for cancer

chemotherapy/immunother-apy and daycare operations for a variety of cancers," said Dr Shyam Aggarwal, vice presi-dent, Indian Society of Medical

and Paediatric Oncology.

Co-founder, Practo said that cancer treatment involves long term care, with out-of-pocket (OOP) expenses forming the bulk of costs.

"The mean OOP for breast cancer treatment could be somewhere around ₹1.86 lakh, accounting for anywhere between 60-70% of the total cost. In 2018, the mean OOP for hospitalization for any cancer treatment in India was ₹85,595, with costs significantly higher in private hospitals. Medicines and hospitalization alone make up over 60% of a patient's total expenses." The finance minister said the

government has added almost 110,000 undergraduate and post-graduate medical education seats in 10 years, a 130% increase. Another 10,000 seats will be added next year in medi-cal colleges and teaching hospi-tals – part of plans to add 75,000 seats in the next five years.

The national health mission shows a moder-ate increase in the allocations, which is just 4%, compared to 2024-25 BE and this will have many ramifications on the already strained health infrastructure in rural areas.

his year's budget comes at a critical juncture when the bounce-back from the covid-19 pandemic seems to have exhausted itself and the economy risks sliding into the low growth rates seen right before the pandemic. Also, as Tye high-lighted before and as mentioned in the Economic Survey, the pace of creation of regular wage jobs has been slower than desired, share of self-employment has increased, and labour earnings have stagnated. The related divergence between labour earnings and profits of large firms has also found a mention in the Economic Survey.

The reason is continued weakness in private investment, due to low rates of capacity utilization, signalling poor demand. Completing the vicious circle, low demand in turn seems to be a result of anaemic job creation and crowding of workers into surplus-labour

sectors such as agriculture and petty retail. Efforts to break out by increasing public capital expenditure have thus far not yielded the expected results. There were voices from corporate India leading up to the budget asking for a direct boost to consumption instead.

In this backdrop, the budget has clearly focussed on boosting consumption and stimu-lating job growth. Only time will tell if the new measures have the required fiscal support and

measures nave the required is car support and the policy structure to deliver results. But first, on the overall budget numbers, it is worth noting that the estimated expenditure for the coming year is only 5.7% higher than the revised estimates for 2024-25. That means that in real terms, the size of government spending is expected to remain approximately the same. Instead, the demand-side push has come in the form of an extension of the tax rebate for incomes up to \$12 lakh per year (up from \$7 lakh) under the new tax regime.

Coming to the supply-side push to create

jobs, one can think of this in terms of horizontal policy measures that have the potential to impact several sectors at once and vertical measures targeted at a particular industry or sector.

Among the former are attempts to improve credit allocation to

MSMEs, greater investment in skilling, a push for better urban gov ernance, municipal services and planning, and lower regulatory costs. While skilling has been a long-term item for the present government with mixed results, the emphasis on urban governance

land and planning is a welcome one. Especially if it improves the ease of doing business in India's small towns (think district headquarters and smaller, not metros and state capitals) where the majority of the urban workforce

resides.
Another point worth noting is the attempt to create platforms for cross-ministry coordination in the form of the National Manufacturing Mission and the Export Promotion Mission that will coordinate the activities of the com-merce, finance and MSME ministries. One hones that the ministries of labour as well as also be a part of these missions.

Coming to sectoral focus areas, the concern

with job creation is also clear when we look at the industries that found mention in the speech. These include labour-intensive industries such as food processing, leather and footwar, toys, tourism and healthcare. On toys and leather/footwar, there seems

to be a shift in emphasis indicated by the elimination of the tiny allocations made under the PLI scheme last year. The expenditure tables contain the mention of a "new employment generation scheme" which has had a substantial budget revision up from ₹7,000 crore to ₹20,000 crore in the coming year. But details are

Alongside broadly subsidy-oriented schemes, there are also sev eral proposed adjustments to the trade regime in an effort to reduce incidences of an inverted duty structure and provide a more conducive trade environment for Indian firms. This is a continua-tion of the review of India's tariff structure announced in the July 2024 Budget.

2024 Budget. Finally, on the supply side, there is a strong signal on reducing regulatory costs as well, for example, via Jan Vishwas 2.0 that will carry forward the decriminalization agenda. On the job-quality front, there is a small signal that the government is ready to think about social security for gig and platform workers. Gigworkers will be made a part of the e-Sharam portal and provided health insurance under Ayushman Bharat. Clearly, this is a very small step given the enormity of challenges facing this rapidly growing part of the workforce.

A Budget that misses out on health of the people

Though there is a nominal rise in allocation, in real terms the hike is paltry. Schemes that aid the poor have been neglected

he government continues to neglect the health sector. In nominal terms there is some increase in the total allocation of Ministry of Health and AYUSH taken together compared to the previous Budget. Allocation has increased from ₹94,671 crore (2024-25 BE) to ₹103851 crore (2025-26 Budget Estimate). Though this looks a significant increase of ₹9,180 crore in nominal terms, if we adjust for the effect of inflation this means an increase of 3.04 per cent in real terms.

Moreover, in real terms this is 4.7 per cent less than what was actually spent in 2020-21. This means, the care that could be provided in 2020-21 cannot be ensured now, given that allocations have declined while prices have skyrocketed.

This also means that as percentage of GDP, the government allocation to health has declined from 0.37 per cent to 0.29 per cent between 2020-21 Actual Expenditure and 2025-26 BE, It seems priority accorded to the health sector in the Budget has also declined over this period with its share declining from 2.26 per cent to 2.05 per cent in this period.

SKEWED PRIORITIES

Schemes which contribute to strengthening the public system and protecting the health of most vulnerable sections of the society, like the National Health Mission, Pradhan Mantri Swasthya Suraksha Yojana (PMSSY), Schemes on nutrition, health research received severe cuts, despite doing good work during hard times. In contrast, schemes to promote commercial interests—like the Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (PMJAY), the Digital Health Mission, are being rewarded with higher allocations-despite failures.

National Health Mission is the key program through which the government intervenes in improving primary and secondary on maternal and child health, disease control programs and non-communicable diseases. Much of these services have suffered during the lockdown. However, since 2019-20, NHM allocations had been declining in real terms. This means that essential services like safe deliveries, vaccination for children, treatment of TB provided

earlier cannot be provided anymore with current limited resources.

NHM money also goes into paying remunerations for frontline health workers like ASHAs, mostly women, who received global recognition for their stellar role during the pandemic. Cuts in NHM budget means reduced budget for paying these workers, who have been demanding minimum wages for a long time. We need expand the network of Health and Wellness Centers to ensure quality comprehensive primary care. HWCs are part of NHM budget. In the context of considerable budget cuts of NHM the plight of HWCs also remains unclear!

PMJAY seems like the blue eyed boy of the government, even though it fails to deliver continuously, known to largely benefit the private sector and exclude the most marginalized, it is rewarded with higher allocations.

In the 2023-24 budget ₹7,200 crore was allocated and only ₹6,670 crore could be spent! Allocation has been further increased by 24 per cent compared to previous year to ₹9406 crore! PMJAY eating up larger share of budget remains a cause of concern while it fails to deliver.

Blind obsessions to promote commercial interest needs serious introspection. A large part of the Dalits, Schedule Tribes and other marginalised section hardly receive care from the private sector under Government Funded Insurance Scheme like PMJAY.

Exemption of custom duty on imported medicines is well intended but nothing more than a mere bandage. Custom duties form only a small part of the price of these patented medicines and the likely impact remains miniscule, if at all the benefits are passed on the customers. What is needed is issuing compulsory license to Indian firms so that cheap generic alternative could be provided.

NEW DELHI: Online platforms such as Swiggy, Zomato, Amazon and Flipkart are likely to see increased interest for delivery-partner and warehouse-worker jobs as the Union Budget has proposed formalising the gig economy, industry executives told Mint.

Union finance minister Nirmala Sitharaman announced in her budget speech on Saturday that gig workers would be provided health insurance under the government's flagship Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (AB-PMJAY). Currently, the National Health Authority (NHA) implements the world's largest health insurance scheme, which provides health cover of \$5 lakh per family per year. Under the terms of AB-PMJAY here is no waiting period and no restrictions on pre-existing health conditions. Gig workers will also be Union finance minister Nir-

health conditions.

Gig workers will also be issued identity cards and be eligible to register on the e-Shram portal, the national database of unorganised workers under the labour ministry.

'Step in right direction'

ayanan, senior vice president at TeamLease Services Ltd, said, "Officially recognising and for-malising the gig economy is a step in the right direction. Including gig workers in the organised ecosystem will help them get employment benefits, and encourage more people to take advantage of the growing opportunities."

The issuance of identity cards will give gig work the sta-tus of actual jobs. So far, gig work has been seen as tempo-rary and mainly for side income. Food and grocery delivery plat-forms, e-commerce companies. "Officially recognising and for-

and logistics firms will see massive benefits as formalisation kicks in," said Madhav Krishna, founder and chief executive of Vahan.ai, a blue-collar recruitment platform in Bengaluru. More than 85% of India's workforce is informal and a majority of it comprises gig workers, according to Teamlease's Narayanan. Online commerce and logistics platforms are among the biggest employers of gig workers in the form of delivery agents and dark-store workers. These workers have become pivotal to the operations of the platforms as speedy and efficiency deliveries boost brand loyalty and customer satisfaction. The number of gig workers in India is expected to increase from 7.7 million in 2024 to 23.5 million by 2029-30. Niti Aayog estimates.

The growing digital economy has created more employment opportunities, especially for the freelancing workfore. As a result, the gig economy is also set to grow to 235 million workers by FY20, when it will comprise 41% of the total workforce. The digital economy has significantly broadened job opportunities, encompassing roles from delivery personnel, cab drivers, and beauty professionals to software engineers and data analysts," according to the Economic Survey 2024-25.

THE TOTAL outlay for health in this year's Budget has increased by over 49,000 crore, with the increase going to several of the government's key programmes such as its mission to increase infrastructure, Ayushman Bhatat as well as allocation for AlIMS Delbi

Bharat, as well as allocation for AllMS Delhi. The total outlay for Union Health Ministry has increased to ₹95,957.8 crore from the previous year's revised estimate of

₹86,582.5 crore.
Meanwhile, Union Finance Minister
Nirmala Sitharaman announced Ayushman
Bharat coverage for 1 crore gig workers.

"Gig workers of online platforms provide great dynamism to the new-age services

great dynamism to the ine economy. Recognising their contribution... They will be provided healthcare under the PM Jan Arogya Yojana. This measure is likely to assist nearly 1 crore gig workers," Sitharaman said in her Budget speech.

Budget speech.
Gig workers are those who undertake short-term or project-based jobs, employed often by online platforms such as Swiggy, Blinkit and Amazon, among others. Last year, the government expanded the coverage of the flagship health scheme to all citizens over the age of 70 years, irrespective of their

economic status.

The allocation for the scheme increased by ₹2,106 crore as per the Budget documents.

"At least people in formal employment are covered by employment health insurance schemes. So it's important that gig workers, who are vulnerable to several health problems, particularly since they work under stressful conditions and quite often extreme weather conditions, be provided some health cover. It is part and parcel of extending the ambit of universal health coverage, which is in a state of evolution, but adding one more section is always helpful in providing coverage," said Dr

Srinath Reddy, former president of the Public Health Foundation of India.

More medical seats

Another significant announcement for the health sector was the increase in the number of medical seats. Sitharaman Saturday announced that another 10,000 medical seats would be added over the next year, gearing towards the goal of increasing the number of medical seats by 75,000 over the next five years.

There has been a massive jump in the

There has been a massive jump in the number of medical seats over the last decade. The number of MBBS seats has increased from 51,384 before 2014 to 1,12,112 in 2024 and the number of PG seats has increased from 31,185 to 72,627.

This increase, however, has led to other

challenges. Even as the na-tional medical education regulator has been working on tightening staffing norms, colleges have been grappling with severe staff shortage. The geographical distribution of medical seats has also been skewed with some places like Karnataka and Puducherry having more than their required share. This had prompted the regulator National Medical Commission to bring in a norm of 100 MBBS seats per 10 lakh population. The norm was later put on hold when some states said they had exceeded the numbers,

but with respect to private colleges and not government ones. These issues were raised even in the economic survey released Friday.

Saturday's Budget also saw an increase of \$1,000 crore allocation under the PM Ayushman Bharat Health Infrastructure Mission (PM-ABHIM), increasing from \$3,200 crore to \$4,200 crore.

This mission was launched during the Covid-19 pandemic to strengthen health infrastructure at all levels, construction of health and wellness centres, diagnostic laboratories, and critical care blocks.

The budget for AIIMS Delhi was increased from ₹5,000 crore (revised estimate for 2024-25) to ₹5,200 crore.

Chandigarh Administration had sought Rs 7,900 crore for 2025-26 but received Rs 916.82 crore less.

Union Health Ministry sees around 11 pc hike in budgetary allocation

NEW DELHI, FEB 1/--/The Union Health Ministry has been allocated Rs 99,858.56 crore in the Budget 2025-2026, an around 11 per cent hike over the Rs 89,974.12 crore in the budget (revised estimates) of 2024-2025 with the government announcing setting up daycare cancer centres at all district hospitals over the next three years.

Two hundred of these daycare cancer centres would be established in the 2025-26 fiscal itself.

Presenting the Budget for 2025-2026 on Saturday, Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman said 10,000 seats will be added in medical colleges next year towards the goal of adding 75,000 seats in the next five years.

As a relief on the import of drugs/ medicines, 36 lifesaving drugs for treating cancer, rare diseases and chronic diseases have been fully exempted from basic customs duty (BCD). The government had earlier cut customs duty on Trastuzumab Deruxtecan, Osimertinib and Durvalumab from 10 per cent to zero.

Further, 37 medicines along with 13 new drugs and medicines under Patient Assistance Programmes have been exempted from BCD, if supplied free to patients.

The finance minister further announced that gig workers will be provided healthcare facilities under PM Jan Aarogya Yojana (PM-JAY) that would benefit nearly 1 crore such workers.

Medical tourism and 'Heal in India' will be promoted in partnership with the private sector along with capacity building and easier visa norms, Sitharaman said in her speech.

The budgetary allocation for the AYUSH ministry has been increased from Rs 3,497.64 crore to Rs 3,992.90 crore, recording a 14.15 per cent increase.

Of the Rs 99,858.56 crore allocated for the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Rs 95,957.87 crore have been earmarked for the Department of Health and Family Welfare and Rs 3,900.69 crore to the Department of Health Research.

Among the centrally sponsored schemes, the allocation for the National Health Mission has been increased from Rs 36,000 crore in 2024-25 to Rs 37,226.92 crore in 2025-26. Moreover, the allocation for Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojna (AB PM-JAY) has been hiked from Rs 7,605.54 crore to Rs 9,406.00 crore, marking a rise of 23.6 per cent.

For the National Tele Mental Health Programme, the budgetary allocation has been increased from Rs 45 crore to Rs 79.6 crore while the National Digital Health Mission has been earmarked Rs 340.11 crore from Rs 225 crore in the 2024-25 fiscal.

The budgetary allocation for autonomous bodies increased from Rs 18978.72 crore in 2024-25 to Rs 20,046.07 crore in 2025-26. The allocation for AIIMS, New Delhi, has been increased from Rs 5,000 crore to Rs 5,200 crore while ICMR has been earmarked Rs 3125.50 crore as against Rs 2,869.99 crore in the 2024-25 fiscal. An insurance, infra push for healthcare

While health research gets a fillip and digital health gets energised, primary healthcare lacks the needed support

he Union Budget of 2025-26 provides support to healthcare delivery through increased investment in infrastructure and expansion of the health workforce. It aims at making more affordable some life-saving drugs needed for treating cancer, other chronic diseases, and some rare diseases. It also seeks to expand the coverage of health insurance, while providing incentives for private sector-led medical tourism. While health research gets a needed boost and digital health gets energised, primary healthcare does not get the needed support. Health research and child nutrition programmes get greater support, but adolescent health and adult nutrition do not benefit from budgetary initiatives.

initiatives.

In her budgetary speech, Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman announced support to create 75,000 more undergraduate seats in medical colleges over the next five years, starting with 10,000 more seats in the coming year. This will help meet health workforce shortages that are limiting access to needed health services, even as the demand for health services will increase owing to a growing and ageing population. The Budget does not refer to other sections of the health workforce.

Compared with the previous year's Budget, the proposed allocation for health has increased by 9.7%. This includes a 9.47% increase for the Ministry of Health and Family

Overall, the Budget focuses more on delivering curative care than on health promotion and disease prevention Welfare; a 7.55% increase for the AYUSH Ministry; and an 18.14% increase for health research (Indian Council of Medical Research, and the Department of Health Research). The Ayushman Bharat Infrastructure

ministructure Mission gets a 26.68% increase. While the support for private sector initiatives to promote medical tourism has been announced, there is no budgetary increase for the Pradhan Mantri Swasthya Suraksha Yojana, which is the vehicle for strengthening the government's tertiary care

Among the major health programmes, the public funded Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana gets a substantial boost of 28.85%. However, the National Health Mission gets only a 3.77% increase. This is surprising as the NHM is the principal vehicle for strengthening primary care services and district hospitals. A welcome announcement proposes to exempt customs duties on 36 life-saving drugs

A wetcome announcement proposes to exempt customs duties on 36 life-saving drugs that are needed for treating cancer as well as other chronic and rare diseases, while also reducing duties on six more. It needs to be seen how far the pharmaceutical industry will pass on these benefits to the patients through reduced drug prices. Support for daycare centres for cancer treatment in district hospitals was announced. Full exemption and concessional duties will extend to bulk drugs, which are needed to manufacture medicines in India. Overall, the Budget focuses more on delivering curative care than on health promotion and disease prevention. While the former is certainly needed, more needs to be done to keep the population healthy.

The Union government has allocated ₹99,858.56 crore for the Union Health Ministry in the Budget 2025-26, including ₹95,957.87 crore for the Department of Health and Family Welfare and ₹3,900.69 crore for the Department of Health Research.

This is an increase from ₹89,974.12 crore allocated in the Budget (Revised Estimates) of 2024-2025.

The government's announcement to fully exempt 36 life-saving drugs for treating cancer, rare diseases and chronic diseases from basic customs duty will make the drugs cheaper.

It has announced additional manpower creation and expanding its health assurance scheme Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana to include gig workers.

The Budget presented by Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman also envisages enhanced care for women and child health through targeted interventions.

The proposal in the Union Budget to bring in easier visa norms and streamlined e-visa facilities is likely to support the economy of States like Kerala and Goa where tourism holds great sway over the local economy.

Tourism contributes around 10% of the State GDP in Kerala and simplified the visa norms will help increase foreign tourist arrivals significantly. The foreign tourist arrivals in the State have slipped to 6.5 lakh in 2023 compared to 11.9 lakh in 2019.

According to industry insiders, the medical and wellness tourism sector will get the benefit of the new decision. The Budget has announced that medi-

cal tourism and 'Heal in India' will be promoted in partnership with the private sector along with capacity building and easier visa norms. Speaking to *The Hindu*, Sajeev Kurup, general secretary, Confederation of Kerala Tourism Industries, said simplifying visa norms was one of the long-pending demands of the hospitality industry.

Preferred destination

For the time being, Kerala, Mumbai, and Chennai are the leading markets for medical tourist arrivals for allopathic treatment, while Kerala is the only segment leader in the Ayurveda and wellness tourism sector. In the case of allopathic treatment, Kerala is the preferred destination for tourists from West Asia.

Further, the decision to

develop the top 50 tourist destination sites in the country in partnership with States through a challenge mode will also benefit Kerala.

Though the hospitality industry has struck a cautiously optimistic note, there are also concerns about how the new policy decisions would be implemented.

In addition, the exorbitant price for flight tickets continues to dampen the spirit of the announcements made.

"The government should also resume the duty drawback scheme under SEIS (Service Export India Scheme) given for the tourism service providers during the pre-pandemic era. Such a step will give a decent incentive for the stakeholders handling the foreign tourism segment," said James Kodianthara, chairperson of the Kerala chapter of the Indian Association of Tour Operators (IATO).

Seaplane service

On the other hand, the seaplane service has not been mentioned in the modified UDAN scheme.

Kerala was pinning its hopes on the introduction of seaplane service to increase the tourism potential and suggested close to 10 waterbodies to start services under the UDAN scheme.

Kerala upset as Budget has no mention of economic package, Vizhinjam aid

Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman's Union Budget left Kerala's wish list largely untouched on Saturday, dashing the State's hopes for a ₹24,000-crore economic package and a ₹5,000-crore special assistance for the Vizhinjam port project.

The State's request for a ₹2,000-crore prop-up for rehabilitation of the Wayanad landslides survivors, an All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) – a long-pending demand – and State-specific packages for tackling human-wildlife conflict and emerging climate change-related challenges also did not find a place in the Budget.

Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan termed the Budget deplorable for rejecting the State's major demands. Finance Minister K.N. Balagopal described it as extremely disappointing for Kerala and expressed dismay over the absence of any mention of Wayanad and the Vizhinjam project.

Leader of the Opposition V.D. Satheesan also slammed the Budget for ignoring Kerala.

Kerala had been unsuccessful in securing the ₹24,000-crore economic package for propping up State finances and special aid for the Vizhinjam port project in Ms. Sitharaman's previous Budget as well.

This time, Kerala had also sought a special assistance of ₹1,000 crore in the Budget for handling human-wildlife conflict and ₹4,500 crore for building climate resilience. The State's long-pending demands concerning the SilverLine semi high-speed

rail system and an international research institute in Ayurveda at Kannur also failed to find any mention in the Budget speech.

That said, Ms. Sithraman's announcement regarding additional infrastructure in five IITs opened after 2014 is expected to benefit IIT-Palakkad. Also, the decision to extend the Jal Jeevan Mission (JJM) to 2028 with an expanded outlay will help Kerala. The State's request that an additional borrowing of 0.5% of the Gross State Domestic Product for power sector reforms be extended to 2025-26 has found a place in the Budget.

The continued focus on investment in private sector-driven research, development and innovation announced earlier is welcome.

Telangana State Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Trade president Prakash Ammanabolu welcomed the Budget for its focus on poor, women, youth and farmers as well as inclusive development. The members were looking forward to further rationalisation of GST slabs and reduction in rates, loans at lower rate of interest and enhanced credit facility under schemes like Mudra. "We request subsidised health insurance under Ayushman Bharat for traders and support in ESI ad PF contribution for small traders," he said.

CEO and co-founder of Marut Drones Prem Kumar Vislawath said certain strategic policy shifts proposed in the Budget will open up new opportunities for farmers to adopt mechanisation and drone technology, especially in agriculture-driven States.

While welcoming various Budget proposals, Aparna Constructions Director Rakesh Reddy said several key expectations of the real estate sector remain unaddressed.

In a move that will ease financial burden on families grappling with high-treatment costs, Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman on Saturday fully exempted 36 lifesaving drugs, including anticancer therapies, from basic customs duties.

Apart from this, six additional life-saving medicines are proposed to be added to the list that attracts concessional customs duty of 5 per cent.

Among therapies set to get cheaper are — cutting-edge anti-cancer immunotherapy drug Pembrolizumab; Lorlatinib and Dacomitinib, used to treat non-small cell lung cancer, Inotuzumab ozogamicin (InO), a chemotherapy drug used to treat B-cell acute lymphoblastic leukaemia in adults and children.

Also in the full Basic Customs Duty (BCD) exemption list is Olaparib, a medication with annual costs per patient often exceeding \$1,00,000 making it one of the most costly cancer drugs available. Olaparib is a medication for the maintenance treatment of BRCA-mutated advanced ovarian cancer in adults.

There has been a 7.21% increase in the allocation for Chandigarh in the Union Budget 2025-26 compared to the previous fiscal estimates. The total allocation is Rs 469.56 crore more than Rs 6.513.62 crore - the budget estimates for the past year.

This year estimates for the UT have been pegged at Rs 6,983.18 crore, including Rs 6.185.18 crore for revenue and Rs 798 crore for capital expenditure, in the Budget presented in Parliament by Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman today.

Terming the Budget 2025-26 a historic step, Punjab Governor and UT Administrator Gulab Chand Kataria thanked Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Sitharaman for the provisions, which would benefit the poor, farmers and the middle class.

He said, "In my 40 years of public life, this is the first time I have witnessed such a significant support for the middle class through tax

Kataria also expressed gratitude for the budgetary provisions made for the city's development. He emphasised the Central Government's commitment to modernising the city infrastructure and prioritising its overall growth will greatly benefit its residents. Major allocations include

Rs 1206 26 crore for the education sector. Rs 987.37 crore for health, Rs 984.85 crore for energy, Rs 958.79 crore for police. Rs 884.31 crore for housing and urban development and Rs 445.84 crore for the transport sector. Various other sectors will benefit from an allocation of Rs 1,515.66 crore.

Of the total budget, the administration has got Rs 6,185.18 crore under the revenue head, which is Rs 326.56 crore more than the previous year's amount. Under the capital head, the UT has been allocated Rs 798 crore, with an increase of Rs 143 crore. Funds under the capital head are meant for development works and asset creation, while those under the revenue head are spent on salaries and other recurring expenses

The Administration had

sought nearly Rs 7,900 crore from the Centre for 2025-26 for various projects, including power, education and transport, but it got Rs 916.82 crore less. Owing to the privatisation

of the UT Electricity Department, the Centre has reduced the allocation under energy sector from Rs 1,093.70 crore in 2024-25 to Rs 984.85 crore in the 2025-26 fiscal.

The following are various fields for which provisions have been made in the budget allocation.

Power and renewable energy: New and renewable sources of energy, and promotion of model solar city programme.

THE health sector received a 9.47% hike in the Union Budget, with a major push to public health, especially cancer care, as the government announced a series of measures, including setting up daycare centres in all district hospitals over the next three years.

Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman, in her budget speech on Saturday, announced that "next year, 10,000 additional seats will be added in medical colleges and hospitals, towards the goal of adding 75,000 seats in the next five years.

She said the government had

added almost 1.1 lakh undergraduate and post-graduate medical education seats in 10 years, an increase of 130%. The total allocation for the Health and Family Welfare Ministry, excluding the Department of Research, is 95,957. 87 crore, up from 87,656.9 crore in the previous year.

According to Dr Sarit Kumar Rout, Professor of Health Economics and Financing at the Indian Institute of Public Health Bhubaneswar, Public Health Foundation of India (PHFI), "Only 9.47% increase in Health and Family Welfare budget compared to 2024-25 BE in absolute terms, and if adjusted to inflation, it is a moderate increase."

"Overall health sector allocations, including AYUSH, health research and health and family

welfare budget estimates constitute only 2% of total central government allocations and which remains more or less same in the last several years," he told this newspaper.

Prof. K Srinath Reddy, former President of PHFI, said, while the overall health budget has increased, it is reflected mostly in raised allocations for the infrastructure, digital health, and Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (PM-JAY) components. "The National Health Mission, the vehicle for strengthening primary care and district hospitals, has received only a small increase. This imbalance needs to be corrected.

The National Health Mission saw a nearly 4 per cent hike from ₹36,200 crore allocation last year to ₹37,566 crore this fiscal. Poonam Muttreja, Executive Director of the Population Foundation of India said the total health budget remains insufficient to address India's growing healthcare needs, particularly public health infrastructure, primary healthcare, and non-communicable diseases. "We need transformative change, not incremental steps. We must address the historical shortfalls in the health budgets over the years.

However, experts welcomed the move to reduce the cost of life-saving drugs, extending daycare services for cancer patients in district hospitals, 200 of which would be established this year, and including gig workers in Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yo-

jana (PM-JAY).

Food must be consumed according to one's health needs and nature. Pitha Prakruthi people must avoid t spicy, salty, and sour food. Kaph people must avoid cold, oily, heavy food that is difficult to digest; vata dominant individuals must always be aware of constipation; they must keep away from dry food.

The Adaptable Practices

The rithucharya, or seasonal detoxification to keep oneself healthy is important. Consulting an ayurvedic physician can put forward the personalised approach, according to *Prakrithi*. Practices of *Abhyanga* (oil massage), *Shiroab*hyanaga (oil massage over the head), Udvartana (powder massage), Virechana (therapeutic purgation), Nasya (nasal administration of medicine), etc are advised accordingly.

URDHVA MUKHA PASASANA Variation pada ardha Bhekasana

(THREAD THE NEEDLE POSE VARIATION HALF FROG LEG)

This pose, a variation of Urdhva Mukha Pasasana (Thread the Needle), starts from Bharmanasana (Table Top). Threading one arm under the other creates a spinal and shoulder twist, enhancing hip mobility. This gentle twist keeps the spine supple, while the stretched arm opens the armpit and stretches the obliques. The cross-body movement improves left-right brain communication and activates the lymphatic system, aiding toxin removal and boosting immunity. The side rotation massages abdominal organs, promoting wellbeing. This pose can be practiced in bed by those with prolonged illnesses.

STEPS

- Take a breath here, preparing your mind and body.
- Inhale and exhale. Lift your right leg off the mat. Bend your right leg at the knee, as in Ardha Pavanmuktasana (Half Wind Release Pose). Hold the pose for a few breaths.
- Exhale again, gently turn onto your left side, dropping your right knee onto the mat. Lift your right hip, shoulders, and the right side of your back off the mat. Stack your right hip on top of your left hip here.
- Inhale, extend your left arm in line with your shoulder, palm facing up. Ensure that your left shoulder, elbow, and wrist are completely touching the mat.
- Inhale, tuck the toes of your left foot in so that your left heel is pointing toward the ceiling, Engage your left leg. Lift your left knee off the mat.
- Your left side should now be completely touching the mat. Remember, this is not a twisting pose, so ensure your body is aligned by turning fully onto your left side.
- Exhale, raise your right arm above your head, aligning your right shoulder with your left.
- Ensure your right arm is close to your right ear and your right armpit is fully open. Reach toward the mat with your right fingers to deepen the opening.
- Gaze forward and hold the pose as long as comfortable.
- To release, inhale and bring your right arm down. Gently lift your right knee off the mat. Now turn your body so that your right shoulder and hip are on the mat.
- Rest in Savasana (Corpse Pose).
- Repeat the steps on the other side.
- Release the pose and relax in Savasana (Corpse Pose).

BENEFITS

- Reduces tension in the hips and lower back.
- Enhances stability in the hip joint and shoulders.
- Therapeutic for dealing with anxiety, insomnia, or back discomfort.
- Helps people suffering from a prolonged illness, even while lying in bed.
- Strengthens arms and chest muscles.
- Improves the flexibility of adductors.
- Enhances digestive system and alleviates tensions.
- Enhances blood circulation in the body.
- Helps in encouraging conscious breathing.
- Opens up the posterior chest.
- Expands the lungs, increases its capacity, and oxygenates the body.
- Cultivates awareness of hip alignment, shoulder placement, and breath.
- Calms effect on the nervous system.
- Helps in fluid balance, waste elimination, contributing to overall urinary system well-being.
- Massages kidney, spleen, and intestine, promoting overall health.
- Helps in detoxification and enhancing one's immunity.

LIMITATIONS

- Those with injuries to the neck, shoulders, lower and upper back, arms, hips, or knees, or any issues related to abdominal organs such as stomach, intestines, liver, and spleen, and those suffering from neck stiffness leading to reviral spondylosis, osteoporosis, sciatica, intestinal or stomach ulcers, or hernia, should avoid this pose.
- If practitioners struggle with coordinating the twist and the exhalation, they should stop the practice.

The Union government on Thursday announced that 36 lifesaving drugs and medicines are proposed to be added to the list of medicines fully exempted from basic customs duty to provide relief to patients, particularly those suffering from cancer, rare diseases and other severe chronic diseases,

Presenting the budget, Union finance minister Nirmala Sitharaman also said the government will facilitate setting up of daycare cancer centres in all district hospitals over the next three years and 200 of these will be established in 2025-26. The finance minister also announced 10,000 seats will be added in medical colleges next year towards the goal of adding 75,000 seats in the next five years.

adding 75,000 seats in the next five years. In her speech, the minister said medical tourism and 'Heal in India will be promoted in partnership with the private sector along with capacity building and easier visa norms. She also said that gig workers will be provided healthcare facilities under PM Jan Aarogya Yojana (PM-JAY) that would benefit nearly 1 crore such workers.

As a relief on the import of drugs/medicines, 36 • 36 lifesaving drugs for treating cancer, rare diseases and chronic diseases have been fully exempted from basic customs duty (BCD).

lifesaving drugs for treating cancer, rare diseases and chronic diseases have been fully exempted from basic customs duty (BCD). The government had earlier cut customs duty on Trastuzumab Deruxtecan, Osimertinib and

Durvalumab from 10 per cent to zero. Further, 37 medicines along with 13 new drugs and medicines under Patient Assistance Programmes have been exempted from BCD, if

exempted from BCD, if supplied free to patients.

The budget allocated Rs 99,858.56 crore for the lath ministry, an increase of about 11 percent over the last fiscal's outlay of Rs 89,974.12 crore. Of the Rs 99,858.56 crore, Rs 95,957.87 crore have been earmarked for the department of health and family welfare and Rs 3,900.69 crore for the department of health research. The budgetary allocation for the AYUSH ministry has been

increased from Rs 3,497.64 crore to Rs 3,992.90 crore, recording a 14.15 per cent increase.

Talking about the allocation, Dr DK Gupta, Felix Hospital, said this budget will prove a milestone in strengthening the health infrastructure. "Many relief announcements have been made in the Budget, especially for cancer patients, medical students and common citizens struggling with the cost of medicines. This step of the government will strengthen the health infrastructure of the country and will help in making India a major medical destination", said Dr Gupta.
